Changes to international travel rules from 11 February 2022 for UK

If you arrive in England after 4am, 11 February, the following rules will apply.

Fully vaccinated – from 11 February

If you qualify as fully vaccinated for travel to England, you:

- will not need to take a COVID-19 test before you travel to England or after you arrive
- will not need to quarantine when you arrive

You will need to <u>complete a passenger locator form</u> before you travel to England.

<u>Check if you can follow the rules for people who are fully vaccinated</u> – includes people aged 17 and under.

Not fully vaccinated – from 11 February

If you do not qualify as fully vaccinated for travel to England, you will need to:

- show proof of a negative COVID-19 test test to be taken in the 2 days before you travel to England
- book and pay for a COVID-19 PCR test to be taken after you arrive in England
- <u>complete a passenger locator form</u> before you travel to England

You will need to book the PCR test before you travel.

You will not need to quarantine, unless the result of the PCR test is positive.

Approved vaccines:

You must have had a complete course of one of the following vaccines at least 14 days before you arrive in England:

Covaxin

- Moderna
- Janssen (single dose vaccine)
- Novavax (Nuvaxovid and Covovax)
- Oxford/AstraZeneca
- Pfizer BioNTech
- Sinopharm Beijing
- Sinovac-CoronaVac

The day you have your final dose does not count as one of the 14 days.

Formulations of these vaccines, such as AstraZeneca ,Covishield, AstraZeneca Vaxzevria and Moderna Takeda, also qualify as approved vaccines.

* NHS APP COVID PASS or NHS Letter or Vaccine Certificate of Europe or USA approved vaccine under EMA / FDA or Vaccine

Certificate of INDIA or other approved countries clearly mentioning 2 doses taken 14 days prior to departure date.

Proof of vaccination:

You must be able to prove that you've been fully vaccinated under a vaccination programme with approved proof of certification.

There are several ways to prove vaccination status:

- the <u>NHS COVID pass</u> if you live in England
- the EU Digital COVID Certificate
- the <u>Centers for Disease Control and Prevention vaccination card</u> for US residents
- a vaccine certificate

Vaccine certificates only

If you use a vaccine certificate as proof, it must be issued by a national or state-level public health authority, be in English, French or Spanish, and include as a minimum:

- your forename and surname(s)
- your date of birth
- vaccine brand and manufacturer
- date of vaccination for every dose
- country or territory of vaccination and/or certificate issuer

Failure to comply with UK guidelines will attract FPN - Penalty of £2000 per passenger.

Travelling with children

Children under 18years of age will be considered as fully vaccinated regardless of their individual vaccination status.
